The following information gleaned from a recorded interview made by John Pell with Bill McNeil in April of 1989 is a short recount of the conversation.

The McNeil's moved to Stoney Creek in 1908 from Oakville where they were burned out of business. At this time Bill was only 3 years old and his sister Mona 12. Bill's father had bought their house at 26 King St. West, **this store**, the bakery business and barns.

CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 The Fire

McNeil's delivered bread by horse and wagon 3 days a week as far as Winona in the East, 2 days a week as far as Red Hill creek in the west and Stoney Creek delivery was also 3 days a week.

One night around 3 A.M. in 1922 a man came running to the house at 26 King West saying there was a fire in town. When Bill and his father arrived they realized the bake **store** was on fire along with McClung's butcher shop, the ice house, and the sheds to the west of the bakery store. The winds then shifted from the south to the north or the houses on Jones street would have caught fire. With the wind shift the barn for the Acacia House caught fire and was also completely destroyed.

Bill remembered 2 men carrying their 400 lb safe across the street, while Miss Slingerland who lived just east of the bakery would not let the men remove any of her furniture, she seemed to have a premonition that her place would not be lost and it was not. All the furniture was removed from the house of Case Springstead, which was situated another thirty feet east of Miss Slingerland. J.T. Chittick's grocery store was across the street and had all the windows broken from the fire when the wind changed from South to North.

Arrangements for the fire protection from Hamilton were never made. Therefore the Hamilton Fire Department did not get permission to respond to this fire for at least one hour, by that time every building in the way was lost.

The building behind him is the rebuilt Welch's butcher shop, the building on the right behind the gas pump is Miss Slingerland's house and the space in between is the empty lot from the McNeil bakery store. In 1940 the brick apartment at 51 King St. East was built. The flanking buildings changed later as the butcher shop altered and expanded while Slingerland house was torn down and replaced by McLeod's showroom which was moved down from the corner of 20 Hwy and King.
