EXCERPTS FROM THE PETER VAN WAGNER DIARIES- PT 4.


Friday July 5th, 1850

Ploughing in the forenoon. Hauled a load of hay from the nigros [sic] lot. Got another load in the wagon and left it in the swale fast to a log. It then rained for two hours with a vengeance. Tim and I under the wagon. E.P. here today with Mrs. P and Mary-Ann in the evening. Alex sick after bringing the brown cow home. She ran away the other day. E.P. must have a lot of hay out in this rain. A good deal of hay out in this rain on every side. Wind west. Thunder and lightning in large quantities.

Saturday, July 6th, 1850

All hands hoeing corn. Towards night went to Mrs. Harris's. After George, Robt. Pew . . . to her not allowing me to take him home with me. Sam and Mary stayed at Fon--- while I went on the mountain. Mrs. P. went to town today with C---B--- along. Mary-Ann Pew here all day. Appointed by the town Reeve overseer on the Lake Road past B[each]. And acquired to ab---- . [Continued on Page 5.]

Editor's notes: Ontario roads were notorious were their poor quality in the 19th century. They were rarely funded or maintained by governments. In Van Wagner's era, private toll roads were the norm. Other roads were looked after by local people, usually, as in the case of Van Wagner, at their own request or by order of the municipal government. This usually involved organizing work teams, as Van Wagner mentioned previously, and paying out of pocket for such work. Hence a crazy quilt of well-maintained and poorly maintained roads existed, often changing mile by mile.

The Van Wagner School (SS #4) was built in 1905 on property sold by the Gage family. The school backed on to the beach and cost \$5200 to construct. It was the third school in the area. In 1941 to more classrooms were added to the rear. When compared to the existing building, this photo clearly shows the absence of the expanded two-story bell tower and the modified roof, which absorbed the dormers seen here.

Request for Information

Annette Schulz of Grimsby is looking for information about her childhood home, which stood at 337 Barton Street in the 1960s. The house was on Barton Street between Hilton and Millen on the North side. It was a duplex with an apartment on the second floor and a red barn in back. She claims the house had been the site of one or more accidental deaths and was known to her neighbours as an unlucky house.

The property was on a 2-acre lot and surrounded by light industry: Stewart Crane on one side and Toastmaster bakery and even a chocolate factory. It had a lovely porch and a little storm water creek to the east side of property. She remembers pear trees in the back. It also had a water cistern, which was supposedly the location of one of the deaths (by drowning).

The house, clad in grey fake-brick siding, was torn down in late 1970s to make way for a light industrial building. The Schulz family lived there from 1970 to 1975.

P.S. Van Wagner diaries continued

Sunday July 7th, 1850
Here today Robt. Pew and his two children.
W. Holmes, Elias Pettit and Mrs. Pettit, Wm,
Mrs. Pew and Mary-Ann Pew, Albert
Carpenter, Dr. Brown and Mary, Edith V. W.,
Hill and lady and child, Robt. Waddel and
John V. W., Henry V. W. and lady. Most of
whom were here to dinner. The day has been
pleasantly spent.

In the morning, we went down to E.P's. Soon after, came up, took our wagon and s---- for Binbrook. Met R.P. and came back. Spoke to David and Thomas Williamson this evening as they were passing. Wind East in the forepart of the day, South in the after past and at present North. Heard some talk about the table rock at the falls giving way a few days ago. Confirmed the Musk---.

Editor's notes: Doctor Brown was also the resident Dentist (as he referred to in JW Hopkins' 1868 diary). Albert Carpenter owned one of the local toll roads (modern King Street at Parkdale Ave).

Monday July 8th,1850 Took Alex Rolls this morning to Wm. Boyce with the following message:

> William Boyce Saltfleet July 8th 1850

Being appointed overseer on the Road, owning no front of the land you occupy, by the Town Reeve.

I hearby give you notice to remove your Cord Wood from said road within six days from the date here. If you fail in so doing I shall proceed to advertise and sell it according to law.

P.S. Van Wagner

When this note was handed to him, he took it between his fingers and asked what it meant. Alex said it was something about the cord wood. Boyce [threw it down]. Mary picked it up. John Clusk (?) then read it where upon Uncle Billy vented his vengeance in cursing me and E.P. most "beautifully".

Editor's notes: William Boyce lived just east of the Stoney Creek Lagoon, on edge of Lake Ontario (see map below). The road in question is the now vanished Lake Road, not the modern Lake Ave.

The day has been fine. Wind east. Hauling in hay for E.P. in the forenoon, for myself in the afternoon. 1 large load cloves, ½ load from negro's lot. Jim mowing. Alex co---ing.

Tuesday July 9th
Hauling hay (2 loads) out of the swale.
Helped George Fox in the afternoon haul timber for Waddel's stone house and brought a load of hay from the Upper plain. Wind East. Just got Cory (?)'s . . . to help haul the boat. Tim (?) commenced cutting the orchard. Sold a calf to a fat butcher yesterday for two dollars

Wednesday July 10th
Hauled 3 large loads of cloves from the clove field. Mrs. P went to town, brought home that Maguire (?)'s child and nurse. Heard today that W. Hopkins would rent his farm for one hundred and fifty dollars a year. The meadow (?) will pay one half the rent if the play could be rented for two or twelve years. I would consider the rent reasonable. Mrs. H --- here all day on a visit. J and J.W. went to town with his buggy to get it repaired. Pasture very scarce with us – our cows are as thin as boards. This is a caution, look out for the future better (?) Wind east with some sea. Wheat turning.

Thursday, July 11th
Went for hay to the Upper Place from that to the surveying Party. Run down the T—

between Galbreaith and Hopkins and Wordhouse (?) and "Hopkins".

Friday July 12th
Mrs. P. at Waterdown. Waterdown wollen
[sic] factory burnt last night. And
Beardsmore's Tannery night before last. Both
insured. Cause of the fire not known. Jerry
Lee and Mrs. Called today. And this evening
Edith, Mary, Harriet Galbreaith and John V.
W. about. Mrs. Wright called in, Cory is very
sick. His eldest daughter and his mother have
come to see him. At work on the shed in the
forenoon. Hauled in two large loads of cloves
from the Orchard and one from the Negros
lot. Wheat opening fast. Fox framing
Waddel's stone house (?) Wind West.

Saturday July 13th
Read today in the paper of the death of
General Taylor on the eighth of this month.

Editor's notes: "General Taylor" was Zachary Taylor, in fact the 12th President of the United States. A War of 1812 veteran and hero of the 1848 Mexican-American War, he died in office on July 9, 1850.



Lost my driving whip last night. Out to Stoney Creek in the AM. Saw Mr. Hopkins who told me he had displeased Esq. Williamson in selling of lot to Waddel to build a stone house on. Townsend and John here about noon. Wet day. Managed to get in two loads of clover out of the orchard. Cory still has the delusion tremors. Read Webster's "Confessions of the [Murderer] of Dr. Parkman".

Editor's notes: The murder of Dr George Parkman was one of the earliest uses of forensics to solve crimes. Dr. John White Webster, a professor of chemistry and mineralogy at the Harvard Medical School, murdered Dr. Parkman, a wealthy benefactor in 1849. Dr. Webster was hanged for the murder after the identification of the charred dental and denture fragments found in the Harvard chemistry laboratory furnace belonging to Dr. Parkman.

A Blast from the Past:



Clough Coal, Mountain Ave. S. 1963

Editor's notes: John Clough and Sons was in operation from 1919. Clough started by running a feed store and shipped farmers' produce on the H.G.&B. extension that ran into his property. This was later converted to ship coal. At the time of this photo the business was shipping coal and heating oil. The building on the right side of the photo was the Stoney Creek Scout Hut (also called "Scout Hall" and "Brownie Hall").

It may have been built as early as 1915. The Women's Institutes record a cooperage at the site. The business was owned by David Davies of Waterdown in 1915, and bought by W.J. Martineau in 1916. At some point, the building was sold to John Clough & Sons.

There is a gap between Clough and 1945. The building was used at some point in the 1920s-30s by the Saltfleet Recreation Club, but that service club failed before World War Two. In 1945 the Stoney Creek Men's Club began renting the property from the defunct Recreation Club. They took over ownership of the building soon after.

With the assistance of the Stoney Creek Men's Club, Wolf Cubs, Girl Guides and Brownies were started in Stoney Creek in 1944-46, and meetings were held in the building. The Scouting program, which had been discontinued from 1928-1948, was revived in 1948 and also used the building. This was when the name "Scout Hut" became attached to the property.

The building housed the Stoney Creek Alliance Church from 1955-58, despite objections from the village council. Winning grudging approval, the congregation helped fix up the building and held services there until their "parsonage church" was complete. In 1969, the land was sold and the building demolished, to make way for the Stoney Creek Medical Building.
